Local governments struggle to implement public space management due to:

- Knowledge gap
- Lack of **political** interest
- Lack of **financial** resources
- Lack of technical expertise
- Lack of planning and design
- Unclear responsibility structure
- Privatisation





Public space management in the Global Agendas


The Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) provides a **monitoring framework** for public space management.

Without management, governments risks a **slide back** from their progress towards the achievement of the SDGs.




















UN-Habitat as Custodian Agency of SDG 11


- Responsible for compiling and verifying country data and metadata, and for submitting the data, along with regional and global aggregates, to the United Nations Statistics Division (UNSD).
- May publish the country data in their own databases and use it for thematic reporting.
- 3. The country data need to be internationally comparable. To this end, the agencies are also responsible for developing international standards and recommending methodologies for monitoring
- 4. To strengthen national monitoring and reporting capacity.



Report 2023 on SDG 11.7.1

- More than 3/4 have less than 20% dedicated to open public spaces and streets
- Open public spaces accounted for a mere
 3.2% of urban land, about four times less
 than the share occupied by streets
- 3. Cities in more developed regions have higher proportions of land dedicated to streets and open spaces than those in developing regions
- 4. Countries in developed regions also have higher shares of the population with convenient access to open public spaces.

Proportion of cities in each region where the population has access to open public spaces, within a 400-metre walking distance, 2020 (percentage)





Regulatory framework

- Anchor public space in statutory planning
- Endorse a definition of public space
- Set up standards for public space quality
- Regulate enforcement mechanisms to avoid corruption



Financial mechanisms

- Secure public funding
- Boost Own Sourced
 Revenue, also through
 Land-based Finance
- Consider informal sector in local taxation
- Promote awareness of donors and sponsors
- Leverage corporate
 social responsibility
- Ensure day-to-day
 maintenance as a
 cost-saving strategy



Recommendations for public space management



Coordination

- Develop **Management**Plans
- Include emergency scenarios in management plans
- Promote PS assessment and monitoring
- Secure essential equipment (internet, laptops)
- Promote digitalisation of protocols



Governance & participation

- Promote mix governance (public + private + civil society)
- Establish long-term partnerships with service providers
- Regulate business-led arrangements (e.g. BID)
- Institutionalise and compensate
 community-led arrangements (e.g. "friends of...")



Recommendations for public space management



Urban design


- Use durable and resistant materials
- Use local techniques to correct instalment (lack of skilled labour with imported items)
- Design for informality
- Design versatile public spaces for future upgrading
- Aesthetic value to promote care from community



Maintenance


- Budget for day-to-day maintenance and longterm upgrading
- Adopt tailored procedures
- Set up skills
 development training
 for maintenance
- Promote a caring culture through awareness and education


